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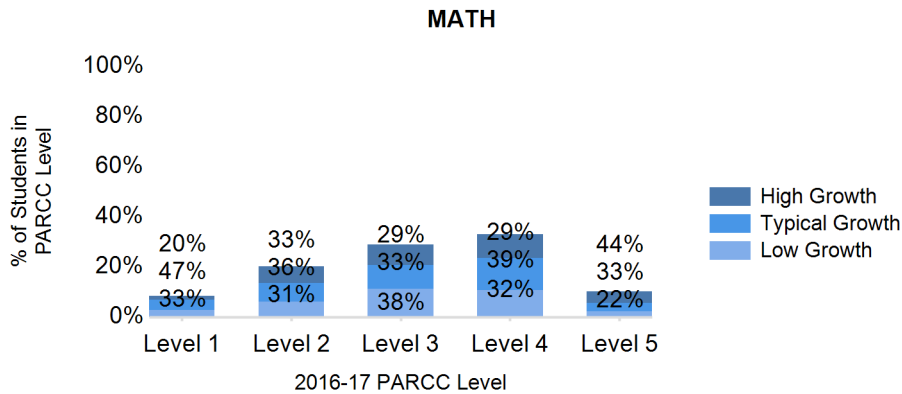
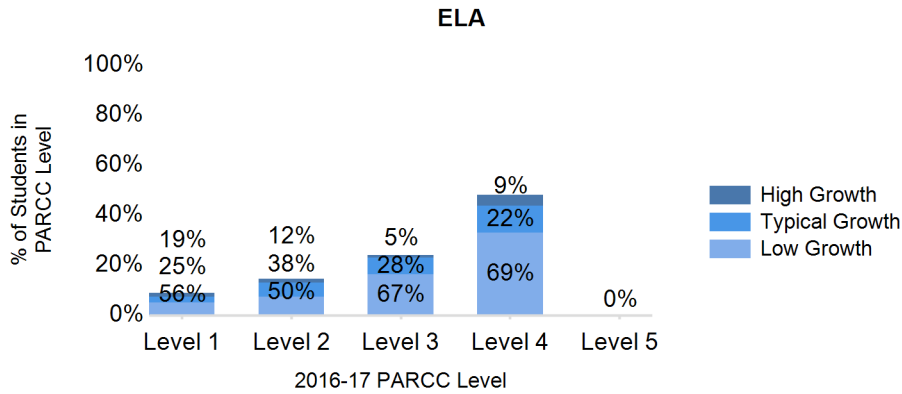
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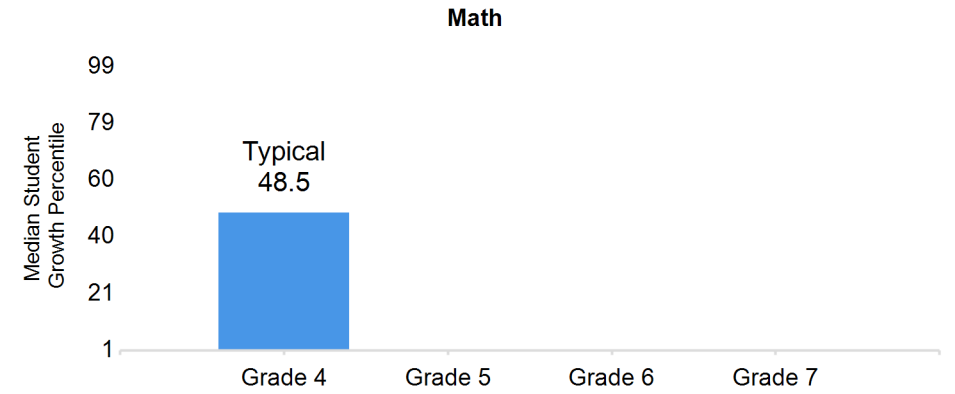
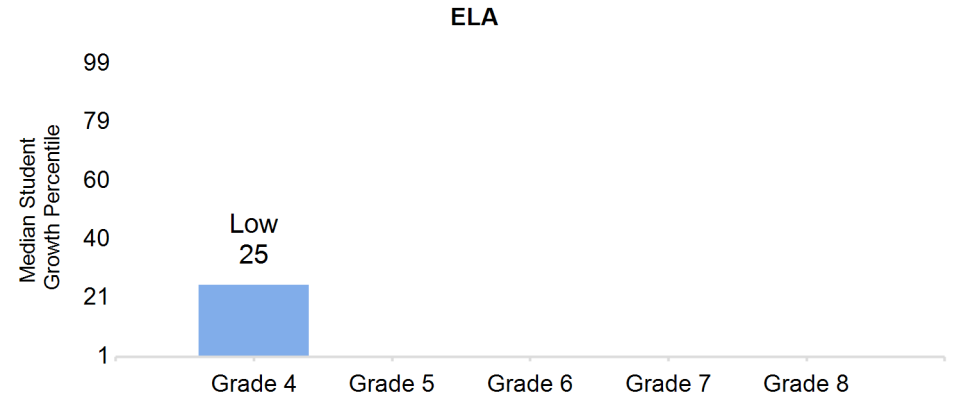
**Student Growth by Performance Level**

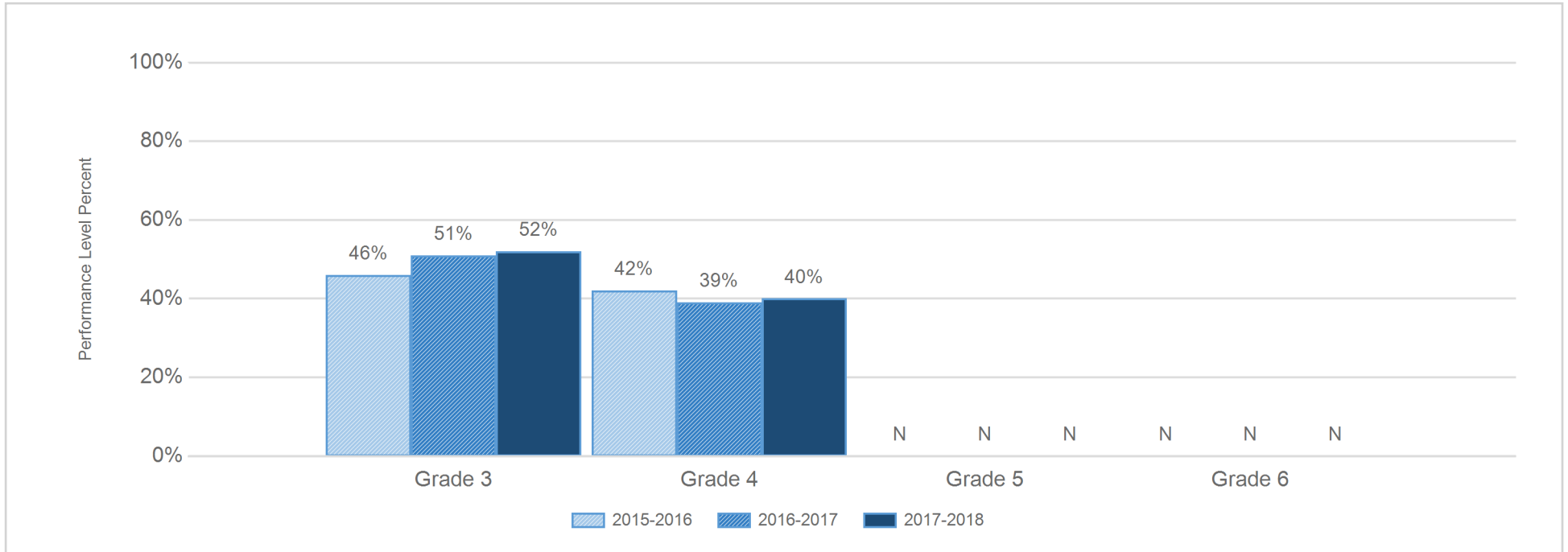

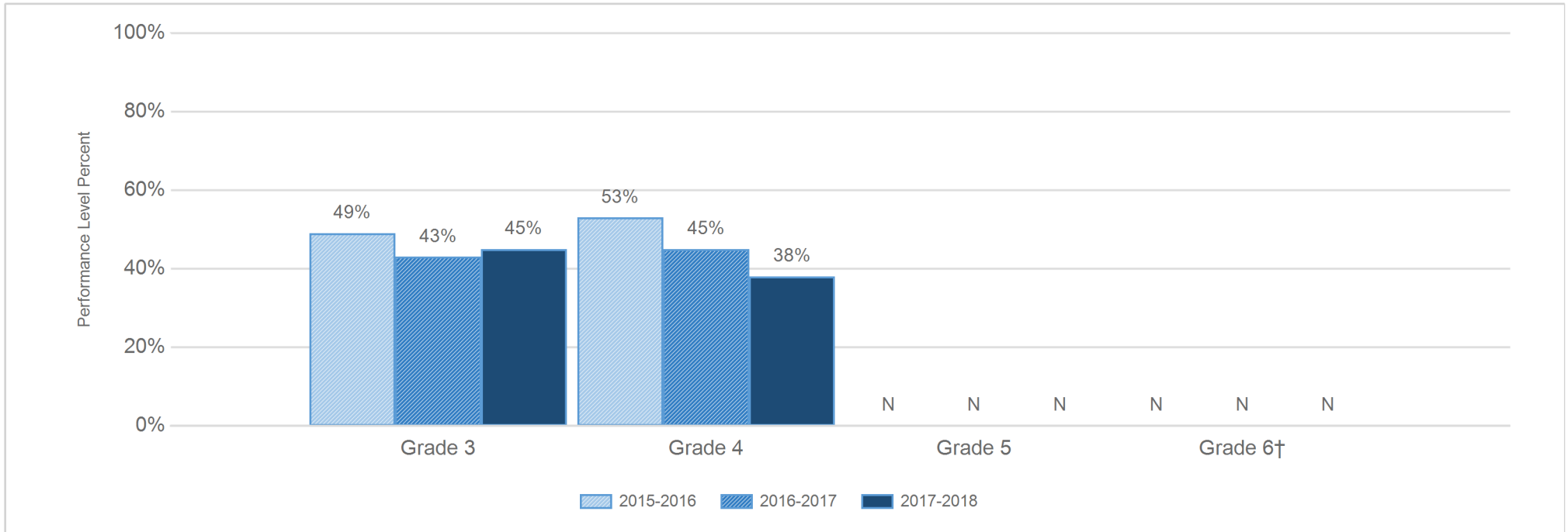

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The New Jersey Student Learning Assessment for Science (NJSLA-S) measures student proficiency with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Science. All students in grade 5, grade 8, and grade 11 were administered the NJSLA-Science field test in 2017-18.

### NJASK Science Assessment Information

New Jersey transitioned from the NJASK to NJSLA-S in 2017-18 to align to new science standards. Results of field tests in 2017-18 will not be reported, but results of NJSLA-S will be added to the performance reports in 2018-19.



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Student absences provide important information about a school’s culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations.

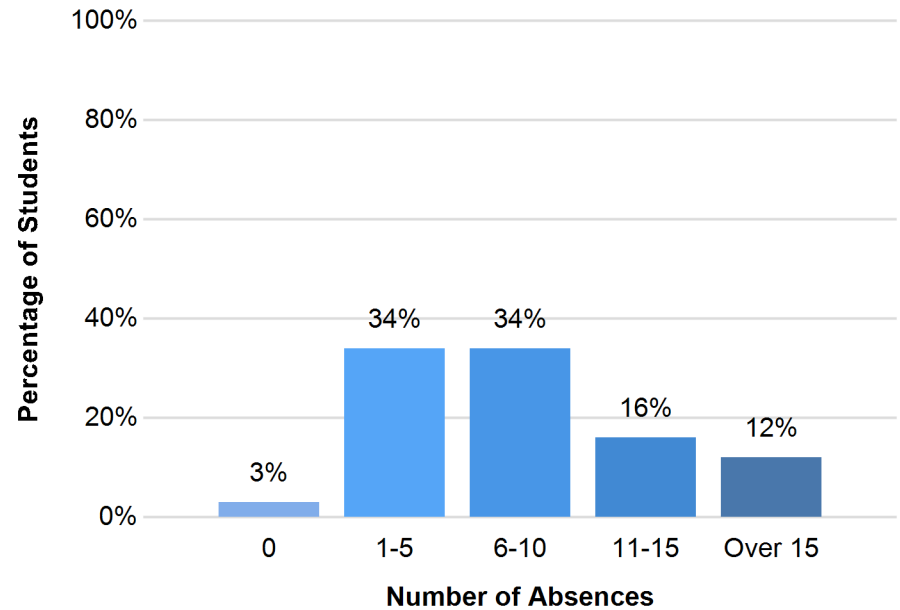

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.







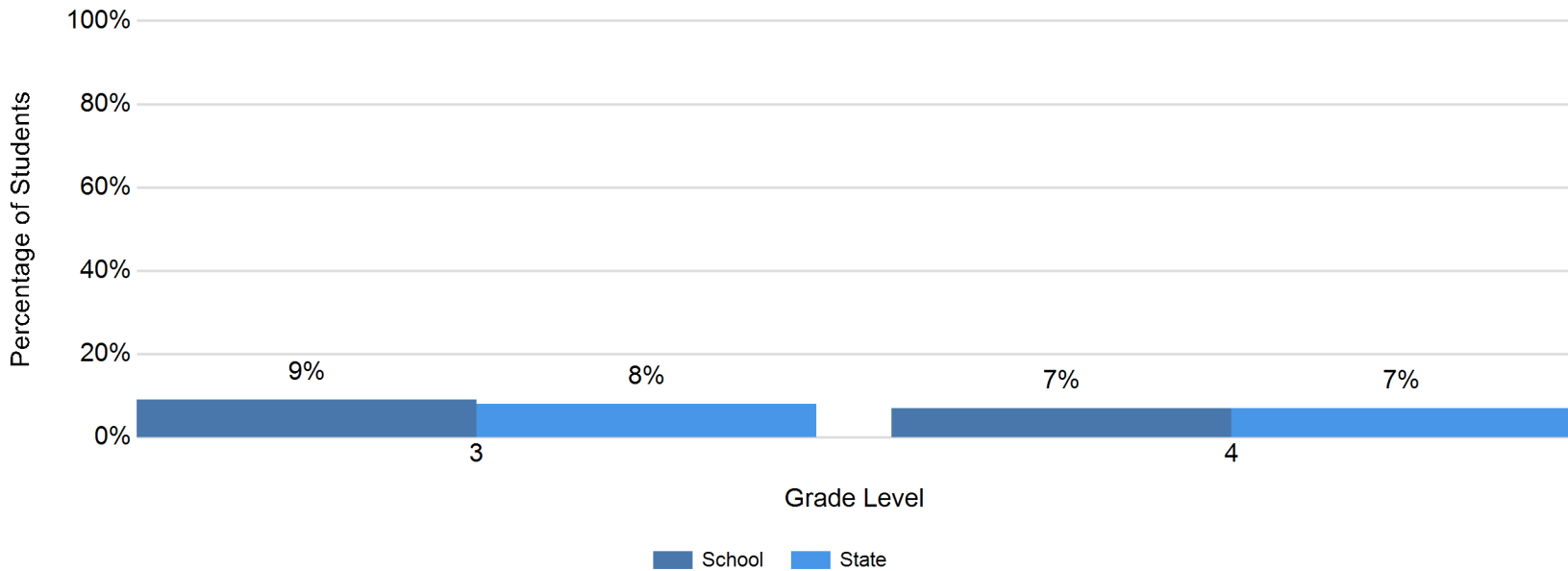
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### Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

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Character education is promoted throughout the school as students are encouraged to demonstrate exemplary citizenship and moral character. The students voted and choose a motto for the year Rock it, Own it. Each month the principal reviews the three expectations, be kind, be ready, and be respectful. The counselor reinforces these three expectations in assemblies, classroom lessons, and group lessons. Teachers are also encouraged to reward students for positive behaviors in the classroom with a doing things right sticker. Each week a student from each homeroom is rewarded a doing things right brag tag and a prize. Students can also earn brag tags for clubs, student achievement, and school events.
